**Paving Project**

North Middleton Road between Waggoners Gap Road and Longs Gap Road is tentatively scheduled to be repaved this year. Township crews will begin drainage work including storm sewer inlet reconstruction and installation of shoulder under-drains in the spring in preparation of the repaving. Paved shoulders will be installed in the areas where they currently do not exist. The repaving project will begin later in the summer with base repairs to the existing roadway and the installation of a leveling course of asphalt. The finish layer of asphalt will then be laid and the lines repainted. The project is expected to be completed by the first week of school.

Your cooperation and patience will be appreciated and will contribute greatly towards safer working conditions for construction workers and motorists.

**Trees and Our Highway System**

Residents are reminded that tree limbs must be no less than 12 feet 6 inches above the paved portion of the street along their street lot lines. Highway trucks, as well as emergency vehicles, are designed to 12 feet, 6 inch high specifications; antennas, lights, mirrors, and other equipment can be damaged by low hanging branches and shrubbery encroaching on the street. In addition, tree limbs should be no less than 8 feet above the sidewalk in front of a home. Please help protect our emergency and maintenance vehicles from damage by keeping your trees trimmed.

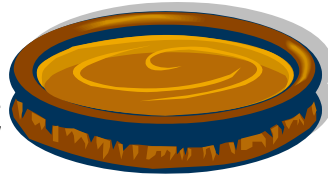
**2006 Curbside Brush Pick-Up Schedule**

**March 8    April 12    May 10    September 13**

Branches should be piled with all butt ends pointing towards (perpendicular to) the street. Branches should be left in lengths that you can manage but as long as possible. For the safety of our employees, branches shorter than 18 inches should not be placed at curbside for pick up. You can either compost these on your property or place them in your toter cart with your regular weekly trash. Stumps or root systems **will not** be picked up.

**Swimming Pools**



Residents who are pool owners or plan to purchase a new pool, please be advised that under the new PA State Act 45 Uniform Construction Code, **ALL** pools with a water depth of 24" or more require a building permit. The required swimming pool enclosures and safety devices shall comply with the International Building Code 2003 Edition and the International Residential Code 2003 Edition, along with current zoning requirements.

Please remember when draining your pool this fall to contain your pool water on your property.

**Burning Ordinance**

The following rules apply for outdoor burning:

- NO municipal waste or recyclables are permitted to be burned.
- NO burning on Sundays.
- Burning is permitted during daylight hours only.
- NO burning or smoldering after dusk.
- Burning must be 50' from any building and 40' from all property lines.
- Burning must be monitored at all times.

Please contact County Control at 243-4121 to let them know that you will be burning.

**Brush, Grass & Weeds**



With spring coming, please note North Middleton Township has a weed ordinance. It states that vegetation (brush, grass, weeds, etc.) growing to a height exceeding eight inches on any lot or tract of ground in the township is considered to be a nuisance. All vegetation on any premises growing to a height exceeding eight inches shall be cut by the owner, lessee, or person having a present interest in real estate. Failure to comply is a violation of the Brush, Grass & Weed Ordinance.

### North Middleton Police Officer's Promote Literacy

At the January 9, 2006 Board of Supervisors' meeting, Robert E. Shumaker was hired as a part-time officer for the police department. ### Water Meter Change out Program

Several years ago North Middleton Authority implemented a water meter change-out program where the old water meters are being replaced with a new ECR style meter. This program has moved along well and this year the plan calls for the balance of the old style meters to be replaced. Letters will be sent to the homeowners explaining the change-out procedure and the time frame in which the meters will be changed out. There is very little inconvenience to the homeowner and there is no cost. It normally takes less than 1/2 hour to do the change out. Your cooperation with this program is greatly appreciated.

### Elevated Water Storage Tank Recoating

Specifications and bidding documents have been prepared to refurbish and recoat the 1,000,000 gallon Elevated Water Storage Tank located just off of Cranes Gap Road. Based upon an assessment of the tank in June 2005 the tank is structurally sound but in need of complete interior wet chamber reconditioning and complete exterior cleaning of the existing paint and overcoating of the same. The recommendation within the engineering report was to proceed with this work in a timely manner.

### Water and Sewer Bill Payment Dates

Water and sewer bills are issued every two months during the year. January, March, May, July, September, and November. The payment must be received in the Authority office on or before the 30th of the billing month. Postmark dates are unacceptable. If the 30th of the billing month falls on a weekend or a holiday, payment will be accepted without penalty on the next business day.



### Pennsylvania's Chesapeake Bay Tributary Strategy

The Chesapeake Bay is the nations' largest estuary, with a watershed spanning 64,000 square miles, including parts of six states and the District of Columbia. The bay has the highest land-to-water ratio of any estuary in the world, allowing the bay to be susceptible to activities that take place on surrounding lands.

These activities have led to a decline in the overall environmental quality of the Chesapeake Bay. Studies of the Bay have found that excess nutrients from agricultural farming practices, storm water run-off, forested lands, septic systems, population growth and discharges from wastewater treatment plants along with overharvesting and habitat loss have contributed to an overall decline in the aquatic and environmental quality of the bay. The environmental status of the bay has led the Chesapeake Bay Commission, a tristate legislative assembly comprising of Maryland, Pennsylvania and Virginia to adopt voluntary agreements to restore the environmental integrity of the bay by the year 2010.

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) has released "Pennsylvania's Chesapeake Bay Tributary Strategy" that calls for reduction of nitrogen, phosphorus and sediment entering the Susquehanna and Potomac River basins.

The strategy envisions that the agricultural community, local government, individual homeowners, businesses and land developers will need to contribute more than 8 billion dollars to achieve this pollutant reduction effort by the year 2010.

The brunt of required action in the state's plan to reduce nitrogen, phosphorus and sediment entering the bay fell upon the wastewater treatment plants. Most actions by others are voluntary except for a few requirements implemented as a result of agriculture.

There are approximately 160 municipal wastewater treatment plants in 31 Pennsylvania counties, including 14 plants in Cumberland County that fall under the proposed strategy.

In order to comply, most of the wastewater plants will need to undergo costly upgrades to their facilities in order to meet the nutrient loadings that are presently proposed within the strategy.

The Pennsylvania State Legislature through the efforts led by State Senator Pat Vance and State Representative Jerry Nailor introduced resolutions calling for PA DEP to obtain input from municipal authorities, farming groups, major industries, and the public. Both legislative bodies passed the resolutions unanimously, which provides a period of nine months to review the strategy and gain input on the specific costs and the environmental benefits they will have for the Bay.

In preparation of the anticipated nutrient loading caps being imposed upon wastewater treatment plants, the North Middleton Authority, in conjunction with the North Middleton Township Board of Supervisors, have agreed to have the Authority's engineers study the financial impact the nutrient reductions requirements within the strategy will impose upon us, if and when they are enacted.

#### Area 8 A/B Sewer Project

The public sewage system for the area of the Newville Road, West Louther Street, West North Street and Meeting House Springs Road is underway. The project, which is known as Area 8 A/B within the Township's Sewage Facility Plan (Act 537) will provide a collection system of gravity sewer mainlines and lateral pipes to serve 130 existing properties with a total of 149 existing dwelling units located on these properties.

The project was awarded to M. R. Ronca & Sons who submitted the lowest bid of \$1,672,027.50 on June 15, 2005. A tentative construction schedule was set with the following dates of importance listed within the contract:

**Construction Start:** October 17, 2005

**Substantial Completion:** 240 days - June 6, 2006

**Final Completion:** 270 days - July 14, 2006

It is anticipated that the property owners within the project area will need to prepare to install their portion of the sewer lateral (building sewer) sometime after June of 2006.

Project costs for a typical residential property will include a connection charge of \$3,100 and the tapping fee can be \$2,600 for a total of \$5,700. This amount can be financed over a period of five (5) years with the Authority. Commercial and Multi-residential properties would pay a Connection Fee of \$3,100 plus \$2,600 per EDU based upon either water consumption or number of units.

The Township and the Authority are also applying for a Community Development Block Grant through Cumberland County to help subsidize the installation of the building sewers from the property line to the houses of Low-Moderate Income (LMI) qualifying owner-households. By using the 2000 Census Block Group mapping provided to us by CDBG the project area is comprised of 37.6% LMI families. According to our best count of 103 owner occupied properties this means that approximately 38 properties could possibly qualify for assistance with the installation of their building sewers. This type of assistance is direct assistance to the owner-occupant of the residence being hooked up to the system. Each household must apply and provide documentation to prove ownership, currency in payment of taxes, and LMI status.

Information on the grant will be sent to each property owner within the project area when it is available from the county.

The Solid Waste Authority of Cumberland County promotes waste reduction, composting, and recycling through its annual backyard compost bin distribution event. Through this program, backyard compost bins can be purchased by Cumberland County residents at a greatly reduced cost. The program encourages residents to divert out of their normal trash items that can be composted and beneficially reused.
